This lecture explores the evolution of a rural locality outside the sugar plantation economy and slavery—the pillars of the Cuban economy during the colonial (18th–19th centuries) and republican periods (1902–1959). Both sugar and slavery have been the most studied topics in Cuban historiography. Thus, in this lecture, the attention and analysis are given to the less known aspects of rural Cuba, which are, and not precisely in that order, free labor, small-scale agriculture, small and medium-size land proprietorship, the internal market, and immigration movements to non-sugar regions.

Nancy Regal received her Ph.D. in History from Columbia University. She also holds an M.Ph. and an M.A. in History from Columbia and a B.A. in History from the University of Havana. She is a former Assistant Professor of History at Adelphi University. Her teaching and research interests include the social, economic, and political history of Cuba; African slavery in Latin America and the Caribbean; and transatlantic migrations in the 19th and 20th centuries. She has conducted archival research at the Library of Cuba, and Provincial Cuban Archives.
