New directions, goals set by SGA

This past year was an exciting one for the Student Government Association, the governing body for FIU students.

The April 1977 Presiding Board elections saw a record turnout (almost 1000 voters) and much controversy, as incumbent Chairman Jose Eiriz sought an unprecedented second term. He lost, but contested the election, causing the SGA to examine its structure seriously.

Out of self examination came changes: the apparent end of expensive retreats, several constitutional amendments, and a move toward representation for the new North Miami Campus.

This year also saw almost \$1 million from students' tuition allocated by the SGA Senate for everything from athletics to movies.

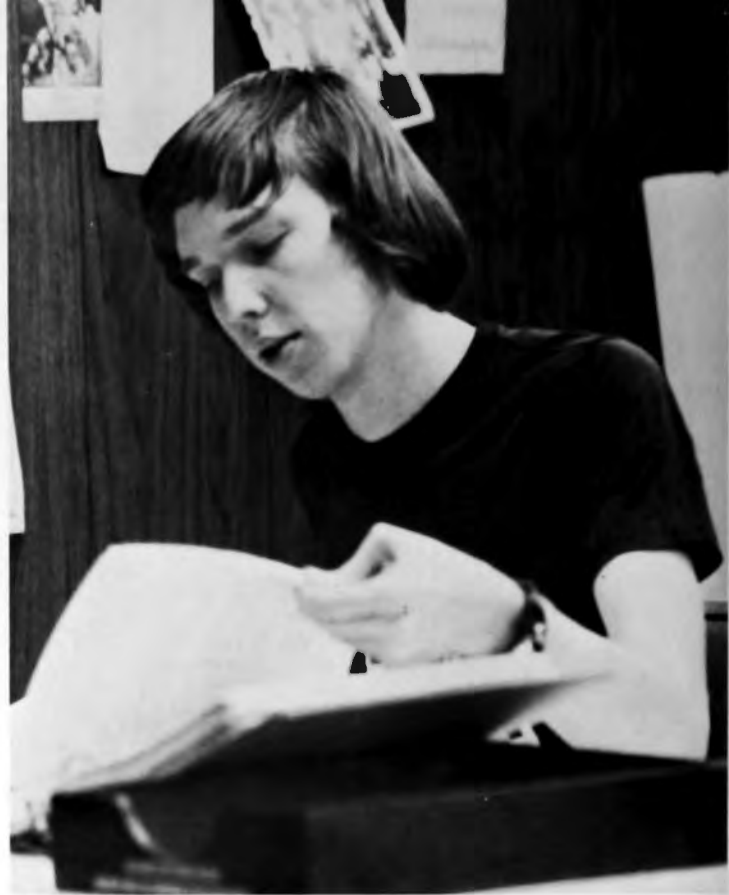

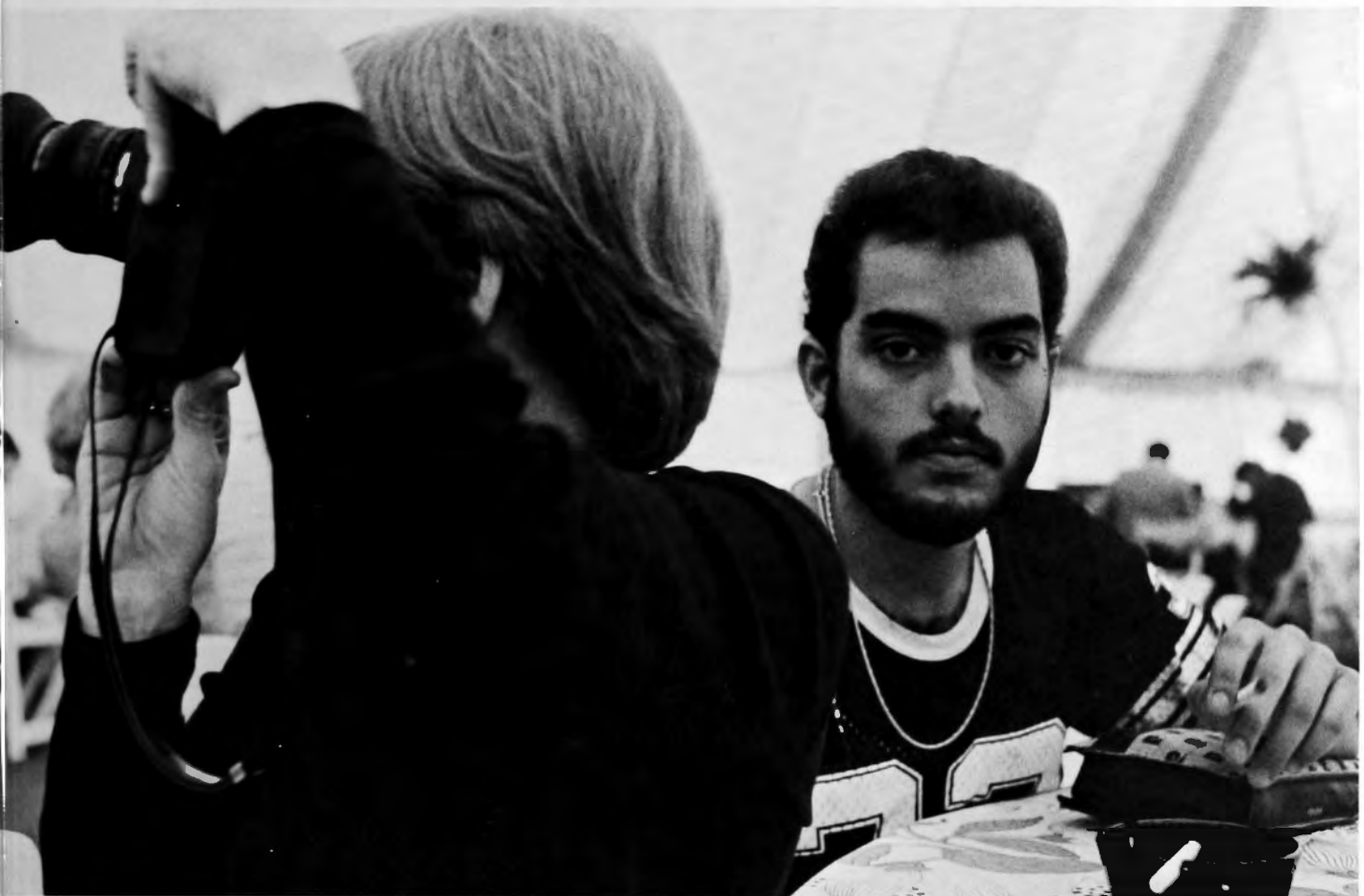
Photography is . . .

Play it again, Yoshi

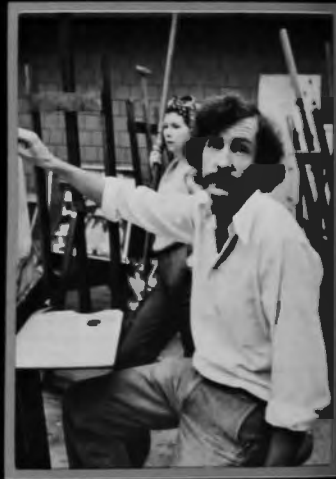
The halls are alive with the sound of music, a vital part of anyone's life. The music program at FIU is a fine one, with frequent concerts and recitals.

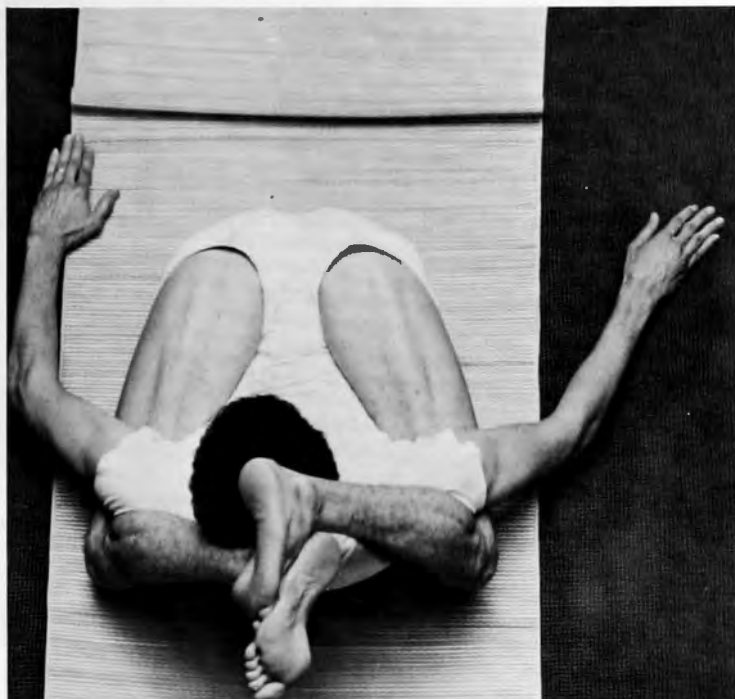

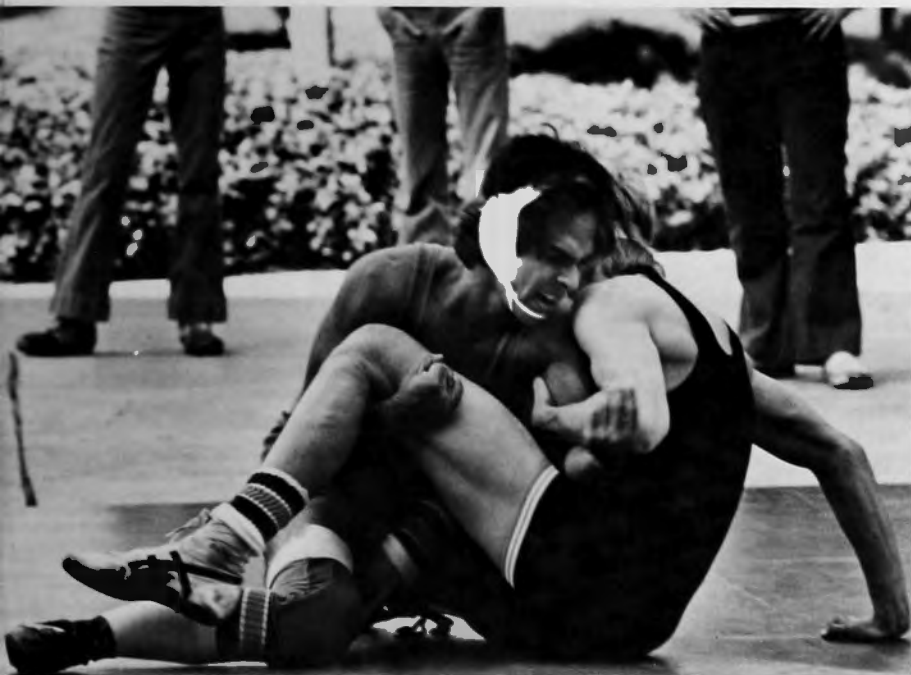

Men's tennis team has powerful season

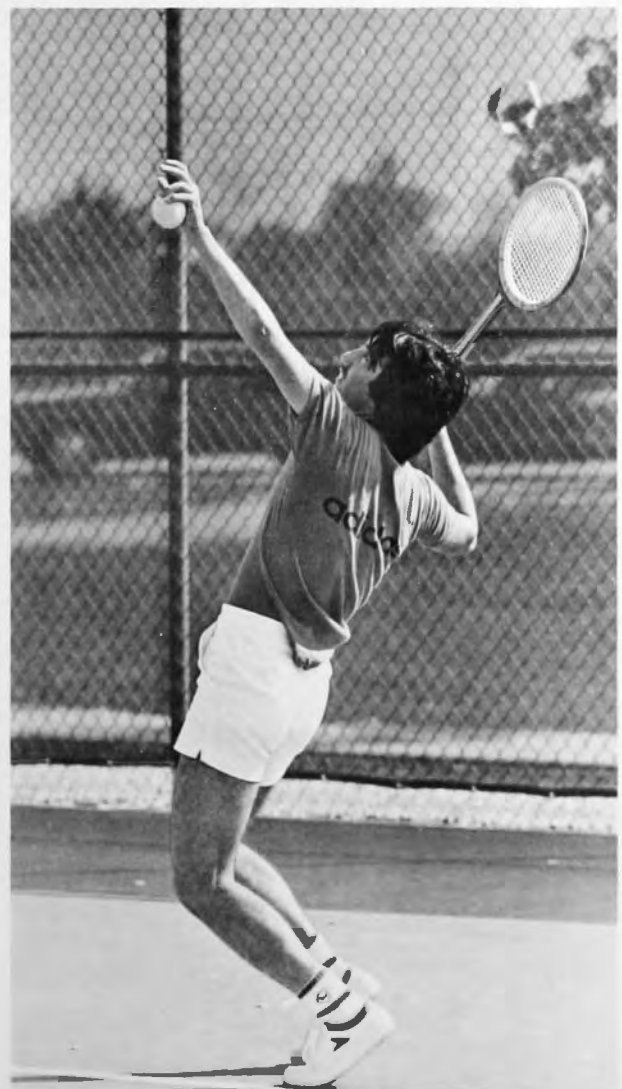
Powerful was the word for the men's tennis team in '78. The Sunblazers consistently gave their opponents problems, as they covered the courts with dynamic skill.

"This has been a very good year. We have done a lot with our physical facilities, have upgraded the campus here at Tamiami and opened another building, Owa Ewan. We have done a lot of landscaping, a lot of work on handicap access and solved some of our parking problems. Education views needs of society

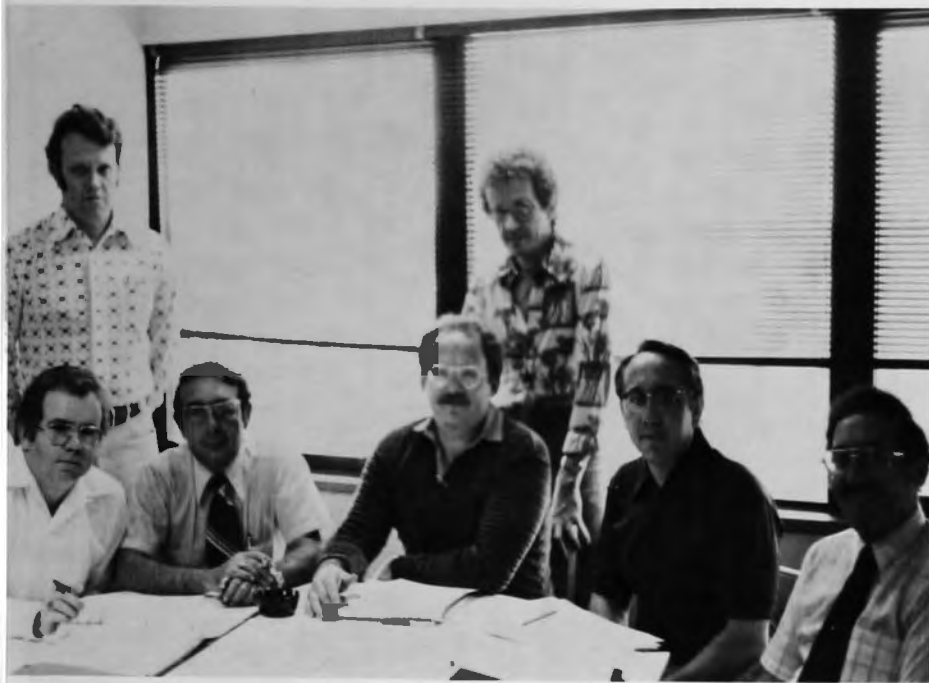

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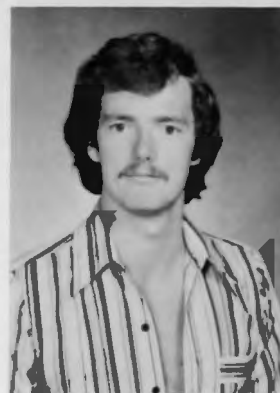


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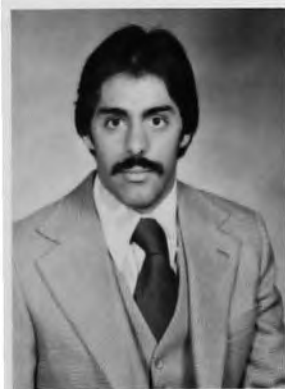
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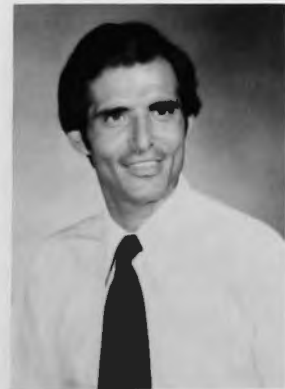
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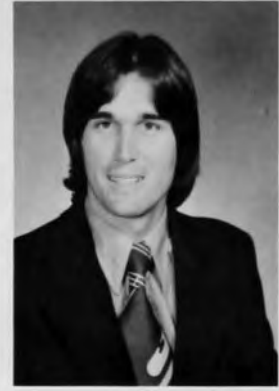
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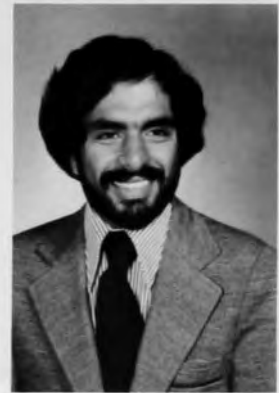
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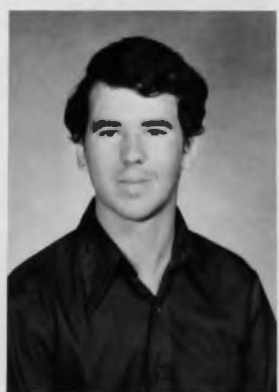
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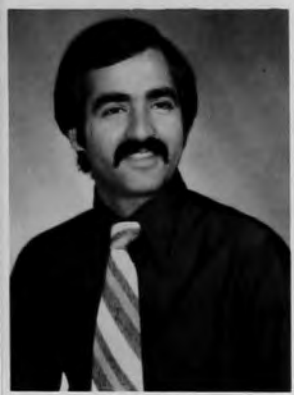


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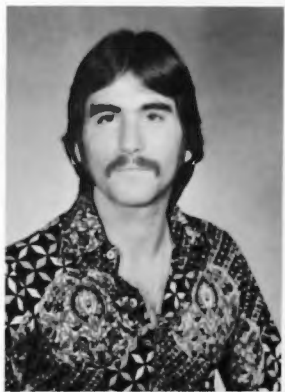
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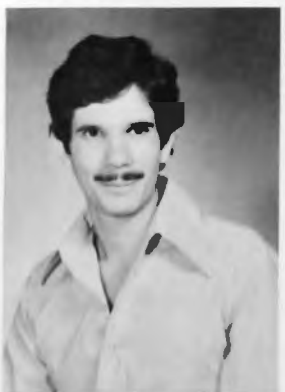
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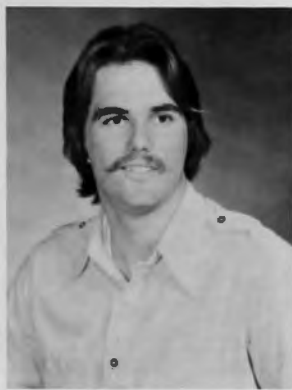


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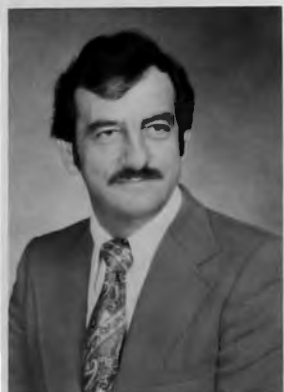
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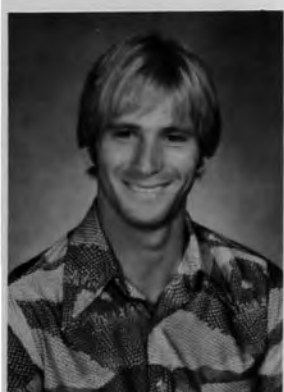
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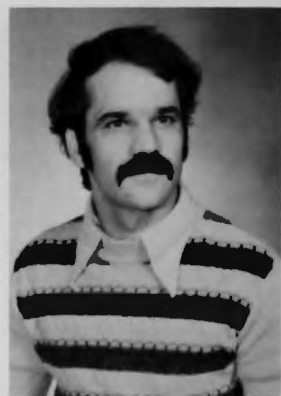
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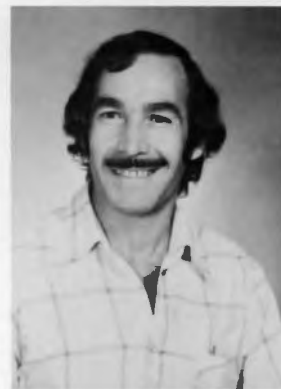
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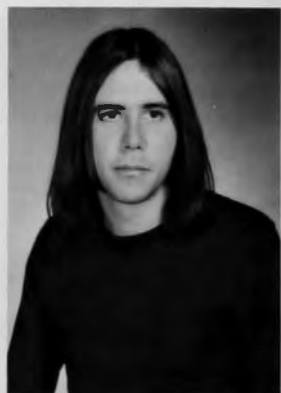
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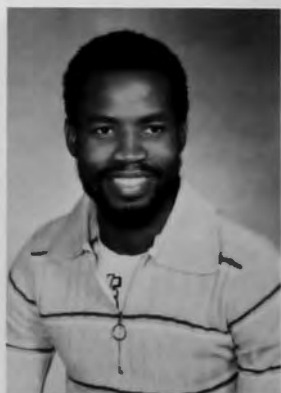
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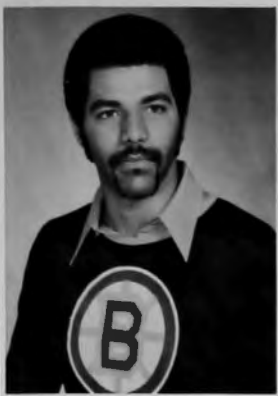


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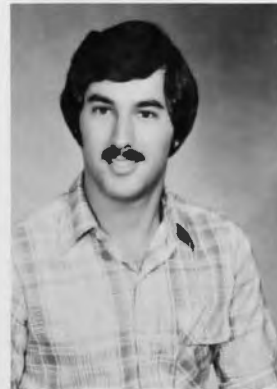
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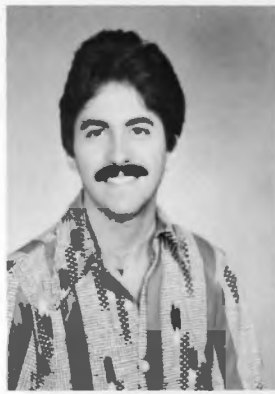
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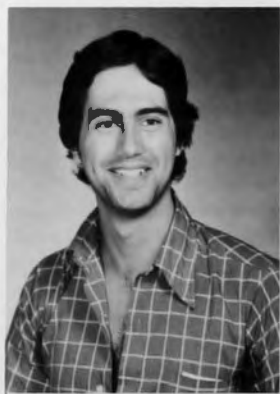
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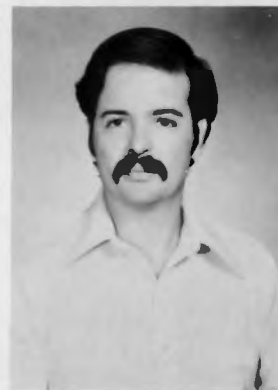
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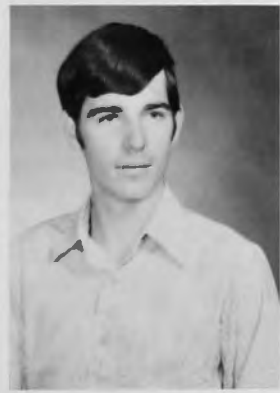
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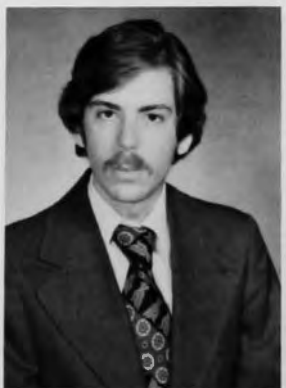
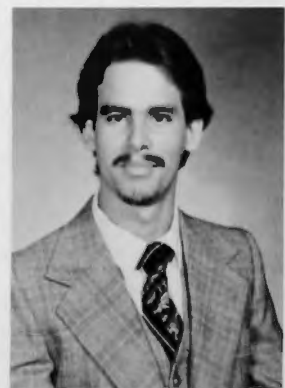
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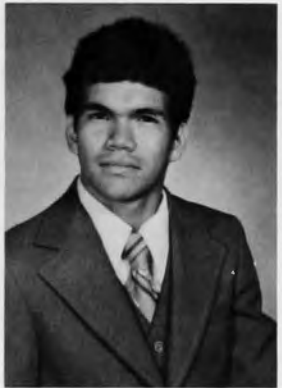




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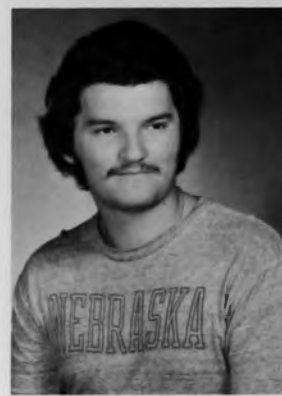
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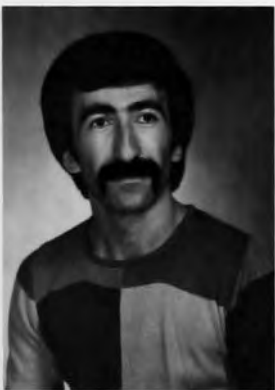
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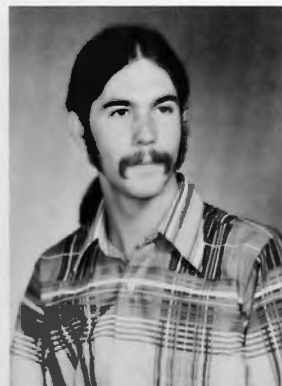
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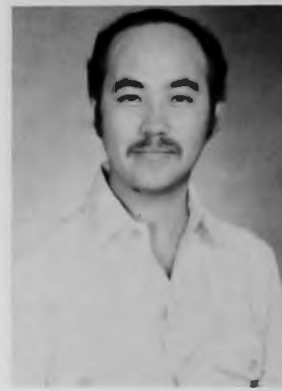


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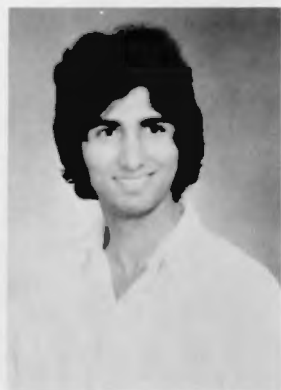
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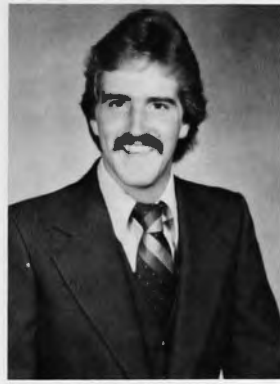
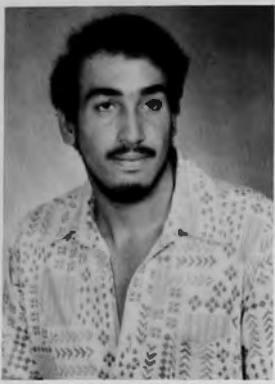


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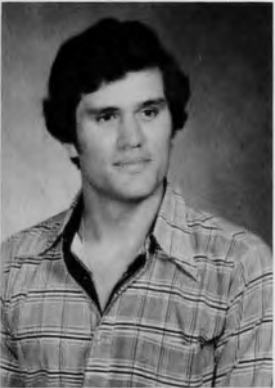


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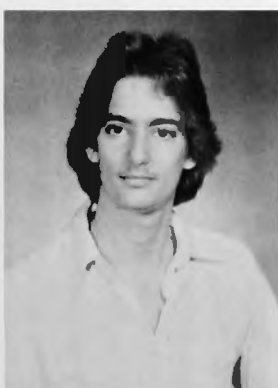
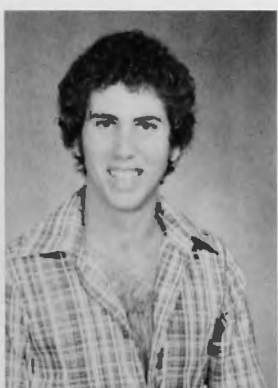
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Did You Know Godzilla Was A Co-op?

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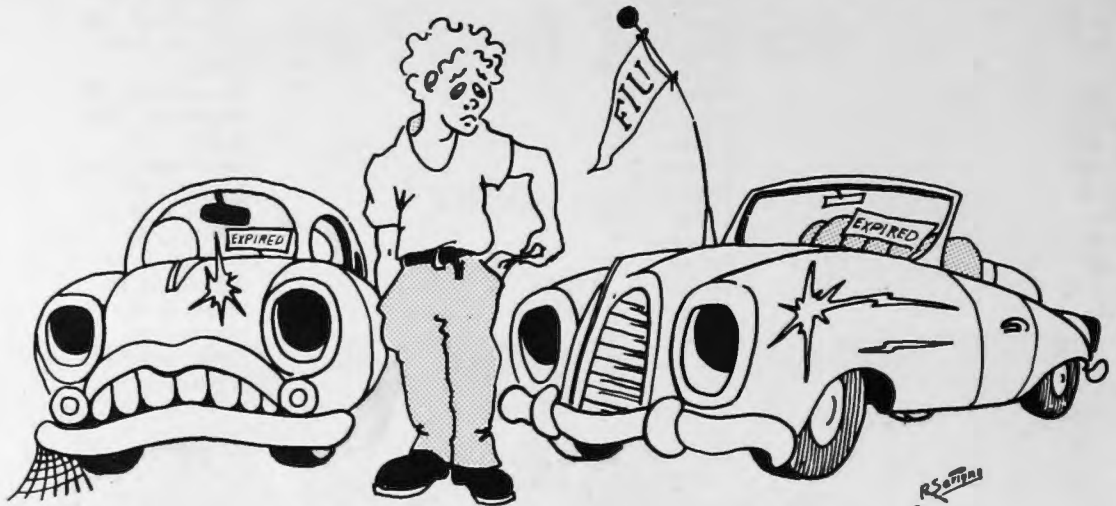
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
