Cuban Hip-Hop in Miami: A Conversation

According to CRI Visiting Scholar Nora Gámez Torres, Cuban hip-hop has been read as a response of black youth to social change and crisis in the last two decades, and as a space to play out new black identities. The hip-hop movement has contested the dominant vision of the Cuban nation as *mestiza*, a symbolic construction that has been successfully mobilized to erase race from the public agenda. As hip-hop's racial politics became a concern to the State and a site for hegemonic control and assimilation, the resistant edge of hip-hop as a cultural form has shifted from racial politics to a politics of confrontation.

For the first time, key members of this music scene have converged in Miami. Join us for a conversation with Aldo Baquero (Los Aldeanos), Raudel Collazo (Escuadrón Patriota), David Escalona (Omni Zona Franca), and Silvio Rodríguez (Silvito "El Libre"). We will be discussing the future of Cuban hip-hop, its racial politics, and the impact that the cultural exchange policy has had on these rappers and their music. In addition, we will enjoy the live performances of these artists.
