Traub served in the United States Army until 1967, then enrolled in the Institute of Design in Chicago to study photography. His thesis, "Edge to Edge," was an abstract black and white series of landscape photographs that were exhibited at the Art Institute of Chicago. In 1967, Traub began his first major work in color, Street Portraits, which was released in the book Lunchtime.

In 1987, Traub helped design what is today known as MFA






