In this important and timely volume, one of today's foremost experts on Cuban history and politics fills a significant gap in the literature, illuminating how Cuba's sovereign electoral democracy underwent a tumultuous transformation into a military dictatorship. Lillian Guerra draws on her years of research in newly opened archives and on personal interviews to shed light on the men and women of Cuba who participated in mass mobilization and civic activism to establish social movements in their quest for social and racial justice and for more accountable leadership. Beautifully illustrated with archival photographs, this volume is a stunning addition to Latin American history and politics.

**Dr. Lillian Guerra** is the Waldo W. Neikirk Professor of Cuban and Caribbean History at the University of Florida. She is the author of four scholarly books of Caribbean history, in addition to *Heroes, Martyrs, and Political Messiahs: Visions of Power in Cuba: Revolution, Redemption, and Resistance, 1959–1971 (2013); The Myth of José Martí: Conflicting Nationalisms in Early Twentieth-Century Cuba (2005); and Popular Expression and National Identity in Puerto Rico: The Struggle for Self, Community, and Nation (1998). She is currently finishing another book called <i>Patriots and Traitors in Cuba, 1961–1981*. A recent recipient of the John Simon Guggenheim and American Council of Learned Societies Fellowships, Guerra's *Visions of Power in Cuba* won the 2014 Bryce Wood Book Award from the Latin American Studies Association.
